- 7. Office Suite: The student gets to know the types of office suites, paid and free, and their characteristics, the advantages of each suite and its disadvantages. The most famous is Microsoft Office.
- 8. Word (Word): In this stage, the student deals with editing texts, and performing all technical operations, such as cutting, pasting, copying, designing, formatting, using templates, inserting images and hyperlinks, saving the document and printing it.

- 9. PowerPoint: A program that specializes in presentations, in which the student learns how to build and design lively and exciting slides that contain visual and auditory effects.
- 10. Excel (Excel): The student trains on using this program to count, organize, and calculate data in tables (numbers), and to prepare diagrams (Diagrams) and curves that highlight the results of field work.
- 11. Email: The student learns how to scan, create, and send documents to his colleagues, how to receive them and open them, how to keep them and restore them.
